STUDENT GOVERNMENT

STUDENT BODY OFFICERS

Terry Switzer – Student Body President for 1964-65. Acting throughout the year with the dignity befitting one of his high office, Terry maintained a 4.0 average and successfully participated in many sports. His main duties this year were presiding over the assemblies and cabinet meetings. He was also vice-president of the Lettermen's Club. Terry did a fine job for the students of West and made a great many friends as a result.

Mark Lliteras – Student Body Vice -President. Mark kept his grades up very well in spite of himself and was a fine sports star: something he gladly told anyone curious enough to ask. He helped with several student body projects during the year and was secretary and an active member of the Lettermen's Club.

Diane Thomas – Student Body Secretary. Diane did a good job of keeping the cabinet's minutes this year. She was a member of West's fabulous ninth grade drill team and newspaper staff. She maintained excellent grades and displayed a natural talent for Spanish. She had better than a 100% average in that class.

Christi Cline – Student Body Treasurer. Christi kept her grades up to the right point, much to her surprise, as well as going out for some sports. She worked on several projects this year, including the school newspaper and the Mother-Daughter Tea, where she held lead positions.

Donnelyn Curtis – Student Body Girls' Representative. Donnelyn came into this office at the middle of the year. She enjoyed presiding over the girls' council meeting. She worked on and gave a speech for the Mother-Daughter Tea. Donnelyn participated in several sports and was a busy and useful member of the tennis team and newspaper staff.

Greg Vaught – Student Body Boys' Representative. Greg somehow managed to keep his grade-point average at a 4.0 while industriously enlightening the student body on everything from how to run the 880 to Romeo and Juliet. He was prominent in many sports and other activities and was president of the Lettermen's Club. Greg collected a great many admirers and friends this year because of his fine mind and outgoing personality.

Leslie Kuehn – Congresswoman. Leslie maintained a 3.8 average, was an enthusiastic member of the drill team, and took part in many student body activities around the school. Leslie worked on the Mother-Daughter Tea, was secretary of the student congress, and was editor of the school newspaper, a frequent cause for severe headaches.

STUDENT BODY ACTIVITIES

The student body cabinet discussed many projects that were to be carried out during the school year.

The school supply store and the paperback-book store were continued on as they had last year. The school-supply store would be operated by students before and after school and during the noon hour. The paperback-book store would again be set up in the library with a student in charge for each period, as well as before and after school.

Several other ideas were discussed. One idea was that of publishing one issue of a newspaper. Another project was the decoration of the Gym for the Christmas school program and for the PTA program. One of their most successful ideas was that of having a ninth grade homeroom skit competition to be followed later by eighth and seventh grade assemblies of the same type.

Recently, the Cabinet sponsored an all-school vote on a constitutional amendment to clarify grade qualifications for student body offices. West voted 713 to 136 in favor of this amendment, which reworded that part of the constitution to read:

“A three-point average will be necessary to allow a student to run for student body office and a 2.8 average is necessary to remain there. Home room and cheerleaders must have a 2 point average to get into office and must maintain a 1.8 average to stay.”

Lastly, our Cabinet planned a ninth grade party. Stan Brown, ninth grade president, was chairman.

THE STUDENT COUNCIL

The Council is one of the three departments of student body government. It is composed of one boy and one girl from each home room, and is presided over by one ninth grade boy and one ninth grade girl elected by the Cabinet. During the first semester this year, the Council leaders were Greg Vaught and Meg Givens. Donnelyn Curtis became the presiding officer for the girls for the second semester.

One of the duties of the Council is to appoint congressmen. At an early fall meeting, Jay Satterfield and Melissa Troxel were appointed with Steve Wasserman and Leslie Kuehn designated as alternates. Leslie was the active Congresswoman during the last semester.

One of the important matters discussed at Council meetings during the past year was the selection of the time for holding elections. This matter was taken to each home room for discussion and voting. In accordance with the recommendation of the Junior High Congress, which is composed of two representatives from each junior high, West decided to elect ninth-grade cheerleaders in the spring, leaving other elections until fall.

The Congress asked for a poll of student attitude on the interpretation of the grades necessary for office eligibility. This was discussed in the Council, presented to home rooms, and finally put to an all-school vote in the form of a constitutional amendment.

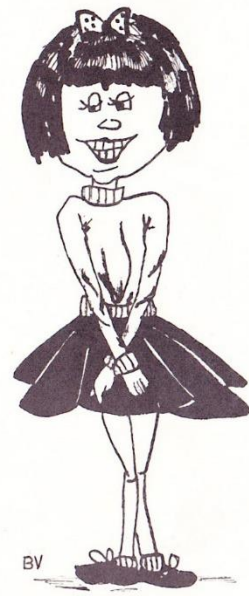

ELECTIVES

GENERAL SCIENCE The general science course was for the student who wanted to continue with science but who did not want to study only the earth sciences. Having a total membership of 167, the band was made up of 80 from the seventh grade, 45 eighth graders, and 42 ninth graders. Mr. James Henry, the director, said "We keep busy just playing music."

SHOP This year the boys in shop worked in four main areas: art metal, wood, leather, and plastics. The first nine weeks were spent learning mechanical drawing. The students learned how to draw and plan the projects they would later make. Mr. Plant did not try to make the boys into craftsmen.

LIBRARY The library was busy as usual this year. The library helpers checked out an average of 200 books a day. That was about 30,000 books in one year. Each class, except a few ninth grade classes, made the trip to the library every week. The library received a total of 275 new books this year.

THE OFFICE GIRLS Each day, as a part of their work, the office girls ran errands, collected and recorded attendance, and struggled with yesterday's homework. There were two girls working each period.
